Looking back, I often think: had I not joined our carving class thirty years ago, I would never have discovered that I could sculpt likeness of portraits — let alone something so personal: we are deeply grateful — not just for the quiet joy, focus, and friendship we shared. Though we've moved on, the memories of that time — the calm, the craftsmanship, the spirits of learning — still live with us.

And now, Judy and I have drawn strength from those years. As an aging couple having lived in the States for 62/60 years far away from homeland, Taiwan, we were unknowingly preparing for this chapter of life — now shared with hundreds of fellow residents at Twin Lakes Senior Community. Here, we continue to learn and grow each day among hundreds of fellow seniors.

It brings to mind the ancient Greek sage Solon (638–559 BC), who said: "I grow old ever learning many things" — and from the East, a line just as enduring: when the Japanese Emperor asked how the last samurai died, his comrade (played by Tom Cruise in the Japanese Movie Last Samurai) replied, "Let me not tell you how he died.
